

Gerald R. Faulhaber

Bio Sketch

Gerald R. Faulhaber is Professor of Public Policy and Management at the Wharton School of the University of Pennsylvania; he served as Chief Economist at the Federal Communications Commission from July 1, 2000 to June 30, 2001, where he worked on many telecommunications and Internet issues, including the AOL-Time Warner merger. Professor Faulhaber's current research is in the area of public policy and broadband infrastructure for the Internet, and the political economy of regulation. He has published widely in professional journals, and is the author of several books, including *European Economic Integration: Technological Perspectives* and *Telecommunications in Turmoil: Technology and Public Policy*. He has served on numerous scholarly boards and review committees and was Vice-President of the Board of Directors of the Telecommunications Policy Research Conference in Washington, D.C. He was an Associate Editor of the *Journal of Industrial Economics*, and serves on the Board of Editors of *Information Economics and Policy*. He has served on the National Research Council's Committee for the Study on Issues in the Transborder Flow of Data. He was the founding director of Wharton's Fishman-Davidson Center for the Study of the Service Sector, from 1984 to 1989.

Prior to his academic career, Professor Faulhaber was Director of Strategic Planning and Financial Management at AT&T, after holding the position of Head, Economics Research at Bell Laboratories.

Professor Faulhaber was a Visiting Scholar at INSEAD, Fontainebleau, France, where he engaged in research on political economy issues in the US and EU; he was also a Visiting Scholar at the Institut Analisi Economica in Barcelona, Spain, also engaged in political economy research. He held an appointment at Tsinghua University School of Economics and Management, Beijing, China as a Visiting Professor, where he lectured on technology management.
